#### **Exercise Yellow Fruit (30 credits)**

In view of the coming World Cup Soccer in Brazil, Giovanni van Bronkhorst, a former player of Feyenoord, decides to start up a new company on 1 January 2014 called "Yellow Fruit". Trading in the Worldcup Soccer gadgets is Yellow Fruit's core business. One potential cash cow is the socalled singing banana (a noise-making banana made of plastic). Giovanni expects a lot from this gadget and decides to think big: he will buy thousands of singing bananas. In order to be able to account for the transactions, Giovanni uses the **perpetual inventory system** in combination with the **average cost** principle. Stated below are a number of transactions that have taken place in the period 1 January to 31 March 2014.

<b>Date</b> 1/1	<b>Transaction</b> Giovanni puts €125,000 in cash of the company. In return, he receives 125,000 shares of "Yellow Fruit" for €1 per share. An additional €125,000 was borrowed from the bank for a period of 5 years with an interest rate of 4% per year.
2/1	Giovanni acquired a van for €12,000. Payment conditions are €6,000 to be paid in January 2015 and €6,000 in January 2016. Depreciation is €100 per month.
3/1	Giovanni rents a warehouse for 2 years. On 3 January 2014 Giovanni pays €36,000 for one year of rent in advance.
17/1	Giovanni purchases 500,000 singing bananas from Rotterdam Plastic Industries. One singing banana costs €0.10. Payment conditions are: F.O.B. destination, 3/10, n/30. Delivery takes place immediately.
16/2	Giovanni pays for the singing bananas that were delivered on 17 January.
2/3	Giovanni purchases 1,000,000 singing bananas from Rotterdam Plastic Industries. One singing banana costs €0.13. Payment conditions are: F.O.B. destination, 3/10, n/30. Delivery takes place immediately.
5/3	Albert Heijn plans to use the singing bananas during its Spring 2014 promotional campaign. Therefore it ordered 1,200,000 singing bananas at "Yellow Fruit" for €0.30 per piece. Delivery takes place immediately. Sales conditions are F.O.B. shipping point, 2/10, n/30.
14/3	Albert Heijn pays half of its bill relating to the delivery of 5 March.
30/3	Giovanni receives a cash payment of €3,000 from Heineken Holland House for an order of 10,000 singing bananas to be delivered on 10 April.
